Member's Corner: Deborah Jackson



What piqued your interest in cacti and/or succulents? My dear friend Michele

Swanberg introduced me to the Cactus Club about five years ago. My first thoughts were: I don't have time for this, I'm not a club person and it sounds dorky. However, after I retired I decided to give it a try and went to a meeting. Up till then I mostly thought of succulents as ice plant like I grew up with in San Luis Obispo. I couldn't believe the variety and beauty of the plants on display at that first meeting. Also, everyone was so friendly and interesting I decided to suspend my "no clubs rule" and joined up.

Which do you prefer cacti or succulents and why?

At first I was interested almost exclusively in succulents. I brought home a couple of cuttings of Echeveria from the coast one weekend, stuck them in the ground and they grew like crazy. I dug out a little part of our front lawn and started a succulent garden. Eventually, we took out the entire lawn and now half the front yard is devoted to succulents and cacti. After winning a beautiful big barrel cactus in one of the raffles, I'd say cacti are now about 30% of my collection. Their blooms are more spectacular and surprising than most of my succulents.

What is your favorite plant family and why?

Right now I'm kind of obsessed with Haworthias. I love the plump leaves that look like they're full of jelly. I also have a love-hate relationship with Lithops. The first time I saw them I thought they looked like rocks and what was the point? My luck with them has not been great overall, but I'm learning to neglect them a little more and they seem to like that.





What are some of the pros and cons of gardening where you live?

My particular yard has a lot of sun in the back and partial shade in the front. Over the past few years I've learned which plants thrive in each environment and move them around accordingly. Also, last fall my husband built me a lovely garden shed/green house where I kept my most vulnerable plants over the winter. Everything survived and even thrived!

Have you traveled around the USA and/or out of the country to see plants in their natural habitat? To where and how was the experience? I did a lot of foreign travel before COVID and before joining SCSS so I feel like I missed out on some interesting opportunities. However, in the past few years, continues on page 3
