After that, his formal career went in a different direction and he spent 40+ years working in different laboratories. It's only been the last 20 years or so that he has been able to spend more time learning about and growing carnivores as a hobby. Ron and his wife moved to Sacramento about 12 years ago and that's when his collection and knowledge really started to grow.

Ron is the current President of the Sacramento Bromeliad and Carnivorous Plant Society and a member of the Bay Area Carnivorous Plant Society.

Ron's presentation will cover the following topics: what is a carnivorous plant; why carnivores; and a little on how.

Ron will then take us on a high level survey of carnivores from around the world and close to home (yes, close to home!).

Are you mostly a cactus or a succulent person?

I am mainly a cactus person. It is too hot here for most succulents in the summer-time and they burn. So I have gotten rid of most succulents and have stayed with cactus.

Do you have a favorite cactus?

Over the years, I've tried to come up with a favorite many times. I simply do not have a favorite.

What piqued your interest in these plants?

When I was all of about 4 years old, my granddad would take us out to the desert for a nice long day. I learned to love the desert and its plants. The plants were so different and strange looking, I had to fall in love with them. I saw the desert before it was ruined with all the dune buggies and so many camp grounds. I saw Palm Canyon when it was wild and free and maybe only one

other person was seen for the whole day. The last time I was there I did not go for they had a wide paved path and hundreds of people marching up and down the path. I decided to remember it like it was in the 1940s.

Have you traveled out of the country to see plants in habitat?

I have not traveled to other countries to see cactus, but I have traveled extensively in California, Arizona, New Mexico, Utah, Nevada and Colorado looking at plants. When in Kentucky many

years ago I climbed the steep hill behind my Granny's house and about half-way up beside a rock was a cactus growing. Many years later I described the location to my brother and he found the plant still there and he brought me several pieces of it.

Where do you live and garden?

I live in Ripon California. I do not garden any more but I still

have 6 hothouses of cactus. I am 80 years old and so I had contemplated the fate of the plants if I died or could not care for them any longer so I have sold my collection.... but make sure that I have some new ones growing from seed or propagated plants for sale in my sales house. That helps my mind and body to stay feeling young.

Where do you purchase new plants?

Most recently I have gotten mail order plants from Miles to Go or other online sources.
