June Program

The Canary Islands, Flora in the Extremes

Across seven Spanish islands off the Moroccan coast that comprise the Canary islands, volcanos have shaped a mountainous landscape in a mild Mediterranean climate that has led to the development of a unique succulent flora. These islands range from nearly barren moonscapes (Fuerteventura, Lanzarote) to lush laurel forests (La Gomera, La Palma). Effects of dramatic changes in elevation, moisture and you've got a recipe for hyper speciation. In short, it's a botanical paradise. In fact, every island features its own endemics, and many species are restricted to just two or three islands in the archipelago.

Russell has made four trips to the Canary Islands. He will share his beautiful photography, humor, and enthusiasm for travel and plants, Spain, its cuisine, architecture, and scenery, as well as giving us a deep-dive look at the islands' rarest succulents. Fuerteventura, for example, has an endemic spiny euphorbia known from just one small valley, while La Gomera hosts at least six species of Aeonium known only to that island, as well as numerous monanthes, giant perennial sow thistles, bronze fennels, tree members of the morning glory family, and many other island oddities.

Russell Wagner earned a PhD in chemistry at the University of California at Berkeley. He found his passion for plants as a member of the San Francisco Succulent and Cactus Society, where he's been a member for 25 years. He served for seven years as editor of Cactus and Succulent Journal, and later published a beautiful book on mesembs with Steven Hammer. A second volume is in the works!

Russell has an extensive collection of (mostly seedgrown, mostly winter-rainfall, mostly South African) succulents, bulbs, and other geophytes, with an emphasis on mesembs. He grows plants in the ground and in his 750 sq ft greenhouse in Oakland. His hybrid work involves euphorbia —mainly crosses of E. symmetrica and E. bupleurifolia, tiny hybrids of Neohenricia × Stomatium (a game he calls Making Titanopsis From Scratch), and Adromischus marianae, where hundreds of new forms have been produced in recent years.

Russell travels extensively to photograph succulent plants in habitat: Mexico four times, South Africa eight, Namibia thrice, Peru, Bolivia, Morocco... and as of 2018, four times to the Canaries, the subject of this month's talk. In addition, at the meeting we're promised a selection of seed grown plants unlikely to be found anywhere else, and maybe a little Canaries-inspired snack!

He will also be bringing a few flats of plants to sell.



I will be in Hawaii for the June meeting, but Elaine Thomas has graciously agreed to handle the Mini Show for me! I will be on the Big Island of Hawaii and will visit their public cactus/succulent garden by the Old Airport. It is a really fabulous collection, and if you are ever on the Big Island you must stop by. I will share a few pictures next newsletter.

Here is some basic information about this month's featured cactus and succulents and a few pictures.

Ferocactus is a barrel-shaped cactus that has tiny flowers and large spines. They have shallow roots and flowers that are multicolored. They are used widely as houseplants because they are incredibly gorgeous to look at. They are also known as the 'traveler's friend' and in fact, a lot of desert art has been inspired by their shape and form.

Tephrocactus is a small genus in the subfamily Opuntioideae which is endemic to Argentina. Like other members of this group, Tephrocactus does have glochids, however, they are uniquely sunken into the areoles in this genus. Spines may be long, dense and needle-like or thin and papery or absent. The stems grow in very distinct segments, but unlike the flat-pads found on the genus Opuntia, the segments of Tephrocactus are round. This can be either in short cylinders, egg shaped, or even spherical. These segments typically grow in a slightly zig-zagged stack. Flowers are white in most species or pinkish, sometimes yellow, and in one case red.

Senecio is a genus of flowering plants in the daisy family that includes ragworts and groundsels. Variously circumscribed taxonomically, the genus Senecio is one of the largest genera of flowering plants.

Othonna is a <u>genus</u> of approximately 90 species of succulent or subsucculent perennial herbs or shrubs, with its center of diversity in the Greater Cape Floristic Region (GCFR) of <u>South Africa</u> but some species' ranges include southern <u>Namibia</u>, <u>Angola</u>, and <u>Zimbabwe</u>.


