

**April Program** 

Talk Title: How Plants Get Around: Flying, Hitchhiking, And Other Cool Methods



Our speaker this month is J.D. Wikert. He will present on the various modes that plants use move from one location to another. J.D. will discuss some of the more interesting ways plants have of distributing themselves across the landscape. This is an aspect of cacti and succulent horticulture that we don't often focus on.

#### **April Program**



J.D. is a soon to be retired fisheries biologist with the US Fish and Wildlife Service working on restoration of habitat for salmon in California's Central Valley and lives in Lodi California. He is a self-trained succulent hobbyist and usually has more than 150 flats of plants in his back (and side) yards. J.D. has been actively propagating succulent plants for around 20 years and has figured out how to kill most succulent species over that time. He is a member of both the Sacramento and Stockton Cactus and Succulent Societies.

You might have seen J.D. speak in a previous meeting on Adromischus, Aloe, Dudleya, Gasteria, Gymnocalycium, Sedum, Senecio, Stapeliads, a general Succulent Overview, watering succulents, and a succulent quiz.

J.D. will bring plants to sell at the meeting. He can take cash or Venmo.



### **Mini Show**

Coryphantha: .Coryphantha, or beehive cactus, is a genus of small to middle-sized, globose or columnar cacti. The genus is native to arid parts of Central America, Mexico, through Arizona, New Mexico, and western Texas and north into southwestern, central, and southeastern Montana There are four characteristics that distinguish Coryphantha from other cacti.

- 1. Their bodies do not have ribs, just tubercles.
- 2. The flowers form at the top of the plant (the apex or growing end of the stem).
- 3. The tip (podarium) of each flowering tubercle has three parts, the spiny areole, the groove and the axil. Without the groove it is not a Coryphantha.
- 4. The seed coat (or testa) has a net-like pattern (reticulate).

More than many other cacti, the Coryphantha change in their appearance over their lifespan. The presence or absence of a central spine is not indicative of the genus, even in fully adult plant.

### **Mini Show**

Euphorbia: Euphorbia is a large and diversified genus of flowering plants in the Euphorbiaceae family. These are most common in southern and eastern Africa and Madagascar, but they can also be found in tropical Asia and the Americas. Euphorbias exhibit an impressive variety of shapes, textures, and growth habits. Some, like the Euphorbia tirucalli (<u>Pencil Cactus</u>), can reach up to 30 feet in height, creating a striking, tree-like presence in landscapes. Others, such as Euphorbia obesa, remain small and round, perfect for potted displays.

Many Euphorbias are succulent-like in nature, storing water in their stems and leaves, making them highly drought-tolerant.

Their foliage can be evergreen or deciduous, and their forms range from upright stems to sprawling, ground -covering varieties.

Naomi's love for plants and nature was a gift that touched the hearts of everyone she met. Her passion for gardening, especially cacti and succulents, was more than a hobby, it was her life's work. Naomi's love of plants began at a young age. At just eight years old, living at NAS Corpus Christi, she was gifted Kalanchoe cuttings by a neighbor. Her grandmother's green thumb with plants like gardenia and succulents, as well as her father's obsession with papayas, nurtured her love for the natural world. This passion followed her throughout her life, shaping her career and leaving a lasting legacy in the world of horticulture. A proud member of the Cactus and Succulent Societies of America, including the Monterey Bay Area, San Francisco, and San Jose chapters, Naomi's contributions to their community are infinite.

She was a longtime volunteer at the UCSC Arboretum, sharing her knowledge and love of plants with others. Naomi also founded her first business in Washington, D.C., where she began cultivating cacti and succulents in a small porch that soon transformed into a dedicated grow room. As her collections grew, Naomi, with her husband Frank, designed a rooftop greenhouse at their Mount Pleasant townhouse, expanding their passion even further. Naomi was instrumental in establishing the Cactus & Succulent Society of Washington D.C., a testament to her commitment to the growth of this vibrant community.

In 1980, Naomi and Frank relocated to California, where they deepened their involvement in the world of cacti and succulents, enriching the local plant community. Her presence at plant sales and society meetings will be greatly missed by all who knew her. In addition to her passion for plants, Naomi had a deep love for travel. She cherished her visits to Namibia, Argentina, the Caribbean, and many other places, creating joyful memories with her loved ones.

Naomi was predeceased by her husband, Frank and her beloved daughter Lisa. She is survived by one daughter, three sons, two daughters-in-law, one son-in-law, five grandsons, one granddaughter, and many dear friends who adored her. Her legacy will live on through her family, her plants, and the many lives she touched.
