DIVISION III — ALLIED INTEREST

CLASS — **Following must have “yellow registration tags”**

55. **PLANTER** - is an artfully pleasing random arrangement of an unspecified number of cacti or other succulents in the same container with accessories held to a minimum.*

56. **DISH GARDEN** - is an illusion of a natural landscape in near perfect proportion as to portray a theme or idea in miniature such as dry desert, oriental garden, ghost town, etc. Think fairy garden. Dishgardens are not just a random arrangement of plants.*

57. **BONSAI** - (for the purpose of this show) is defined as the art of “miniaturizing” a cactus and/or succulent in as near perfect proportion as possible to create the illusion of a natural, full-grown plant in one container.*

58. **NATURE’S CONTAINER** - is defined as a natural receptacle (not handmade or manufactured) planted with cacti and/or other succulents.*

59. **LIVING COMPOSITION** - is defined as a cactus and/or other succulent plant selected to imitate the container in which it is staged, e.g., Euphorbia caput-medusa planted in a ceramic head and titled on a 3x5 card “Just washed my hair and can’t do a thing with it.” *

**Accessories permitted, i.e., top soil, decorative rock, dried plant material, ceramic ornaments, etc., to enhance the aesthetics of the exhibit.*

Botanical name/label is not required for the five classifications above.
